Preparing for the Holidays



The first snow arrived a few days ago and I was happy to learn that my new hip was wellequipped to push some very wet white stuff off the driveway. After a fairly balmy and very dry November, our droughtstricken New England was grateful for the winter weather, despite the slushy mess.

All my children, their partners, their children, and a brand-new German Shepherd puppy will descend upon us over the next few weeks and I am both thrilled and deep into preparations.

The candles went in the windows on Thanksgiving—a New England tradition that dates back to Colonial times and is a sign of welcome and shelter to travelers. The wreaths are now hanging on either side of the front door. The mantel is draped in a pine garland with white fairy lights. Tonight, I'll begin hauling containers out of the basement filled with decorations, some as old as my childhood and others collected over the years. Each day throughout our neighborhood, new figures are appearing on front lawns—Santas driving tractors, a Grinch, a moose, snowmen, and elves, among many others. I can't wait to take my granddaughters on a walking tour.

I'm also planning menus and cooking ahead. I don't do the "Seven Fishes" on Christmas Eve as my mother and grandmother did. When our parents were alive, my husband and I and our children spent Christmas Eve with the German side of the family (his) and Christmas Day with the Italians (mine), and the foods we shared evolved over the years. Now, we have an eclectic buffet on Christmas Eve: shrimp cocktail; a salad of octopus dressed in olive oil, lemon juice, garlic and parsley; deviled eggs; breadsticks wrapped in bacon that's been dredged in brown sugar and chili powder; zucchini, artichoke and spinach pie baked with eggs and mozzarella; smoked salmon; my mother-in-law's German crescent cookies and my grandmother's lemon-and-orange flavored cookies with icing and colored sprinkles.

It is bringing me great joy this year to prepare for my family. My children lead busy lives in far-flung places and to have everyone together is a gift, far more precious than anything under the tree.

I hope your own holidays are filled with joy and the presence of those you love.






